

Chengdu Shude High School International Baccalaureate Diploma Program Assessment and Reporting Policy and Procedures

August 2015

I. General Philosophy

The fundamental objective of IB assessments and evaluations at Chengdu Shude High School is to support and improve teaching and learning.

All assessment components are designed according to the curriculum requirements in IBO subject guides. All subjects will be graded according to the assessment criteria provided in the IBO subject guides and the assessment process will be strictly guided by the IBO guidelines and practices.

Chengdu Shude High School tries its best to implement best practices as it applies to assessment policy across the IB diploma program as a whole and within each discipline. The principal areas of focus are outlined below.

II. Reasons for Assessment and Evaluation

Chengdu Shude High School assesses students for a diversity of reasons:

- To provide feedback to students regarding their own studies
- To provide feedback to students on their performance against the criteria outlined by the IBO
- To provide a grade for reporting to parents
- To provide information for university admission
- To provide feedback to teachers and the school's management team about students' knowledge, understanding and skill development
- > To provide a teaching quality control mechanism

III. Methods of Assessment

Chengdu Shude High School utilizes a widely-accepted variety of both formative and summative methods of assessment.

Types of assessment delivered on a subject-specified basis include, but are not limited to: class discussions, written tasks, essay questions, experimental investigations, fieldwork, group and individual oral presentations, multiple-choice style quizzes and tests, short and extended-response questions, art portfolios, etc.

The term grade of each subject will consist of the following parts as shown in the tables below:

- 1. During DP1 and DP2, the mid-term exam will be administrated collectively in the form of written exams for subjects in Group 3, 4 and 5. The mid-term exam of group 1 and 2 will not be conducted collectively, the form being chosen collectively by group meeting to be held by HODs (Head of Department). The subjects in group 3, 4 and 5 can apply for another form of mid-term exam in class when necessary.
- 2. The subject-specific assessment should be chosen strictly according to the course requirement released by IBO and should be chosen carefully based on a collective discussion held by the HOD within the subject group.
- 3. The final term exam will be organized officially following rules set by IBO for the May Global Exam.

IV. Make-up Exams & Early Exams for Special Circumstances

Students meeting the following requirements are eligible for a make-up exam or an early exam:

The solutions to other special circumstances not listed in the table above will be discussed within subject groups led by HODs and be affirmed by the coordinator. No make-up or early exam is conducted for subject specific assessments and Mock Examinations.

V. Students' Attendance

In order to fulfill IBDP study requirements, students have to study at least 240 hours for HL courses and at least 150 hours for SL courses. According to the school calendar, students must guarantee 90% or above attendance rate of each subject to meet the course hour requirement. If the attendance rate of a subject is below 90%, the term grade of the subject will be affected as shown in the table below:

Any student who cannot attend classes to guarantee 60% of one subject due to sickness is requested to repeat the course. The Student's accomplishment of the course hour requirement has to be affirmed by the subject teacher and the coordinator.

Attendance rate will not be counted as an assessment component.

VII. Criteria for Promotion

Promotion from Year 10 to the IBDP Program, and successively from Year 11 to Year 12 will depend on a student meeting the requirements of the corresponding year.



In addition to the above, students wishing to pass into Year 12 will also need to have,

- Met all IB internal deadlines and submitted all work relevant to Year 11;
- Prepared a complete first draft of their Extended Essay for submission on due date at the beginning of Year 12.

A student who fails to meet the criteria for promotion may be asked, after due consultation,

- To re-sit specific assessments in order to earn the necessary grades to be promoted.
- To complete specific tasks (for example, completing unfinished class and/or homework assignments) in order to demonstrate the necessary competence to be promoted.

VIII. Reporting

1. Procedures of Releasing Scores

After the admin<mark>istration</mark> of each officially-organized written exam, the subject teachers must finalize the score of each student and input the data into Managebac within a week after the exam session finishes.

Results on Managebac are automatically considered as finalized and scores confirmed within a week after the exam session finishes. The data will be locked and will be generated in the form of spreadsheets and the school reports by the coordinator. Scores will be sent to the study office to be archived and sent to the homeroom advisor for the parent's meeting.

We understand that once the score is released to the student, some enquiries on scoring or honest input errors on Managebac are possible. Therefore, subject teachers must confirm the scores before Managebac is locked.

The score of the early exam will not be released in advance, but in line with the previously established release date (see above). The scores for make-up exams will be released on the day after the exams. The updated scores will be reported to related parties separately.

2. Reporting to Students And Parents





Once the scores are input into Managebac, students are able to see their grades.

A school report with mid-term grades or term grades of a student will be generated from Managebac by the coordinator for parents every half term in parents' meetings.

3. Reporting to Universities

As one of the most significant documents in the student's application package to foreign universities, we highly value the equity, fairness and accuracy of the transcript.

A transcript with term grades will be sent to universities following requests. The time-frame for sending these grades is generally represented in the table below:
